The Grand Canyon is only a 4 hour drive but you will want to stop along the way to see the many sights: the red rocks and mystic vortexes of Sedona; Flagstaff and Oak Creek canyon with its natural water slide, Meteor Crater, the massive Indian diff dwellings of Walnut Canyon; and drive back via the backroads through the Ghost Town of Jerome; stop off at the diff dwelling of Montezuma's Castle or the fantastic architectural vision of Paolo Soleri at Arcosanti. Continue your visit to indude the Painted Desert, the Petrified Forest, the ribbon canyons of Lake Powell in Page AZ, or re-capture the 50's on Old Route 66 in Seligman.



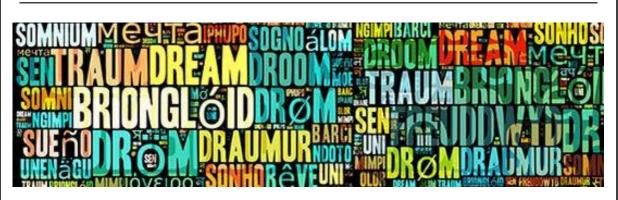
CALL FOR 2017 RESEARCH GRANT PROPOSALS

Recently, we have experienced an Equinox – those two times each year (20 March and 23 September) that day equals night. This is always a good time to reflect on your inner balance. I hope that your dream life has embraced this balance between light and day.

The Regional Representatives Committee has undertaken a project to participate in <u>Brain</u> <u>Awareness Week</u> "a global campaign to increase public awareness of the progress and benefits of brain research." It's an initiative of the <u>Dana</u> <u>Foundation</u>, "a private philanthropic organization that supports brain research through grants, publications, and educational programs." IASD is now registered as a BAW partner. There are dozens or maybe hundreds of partners, located around the world.

BAW is an annual event, and the dates for the next one are March 12-18, 2018. We plan to start small for BAW 2018, and then build IASD's participation each year, if possible.

For BAW 2018, we plan to prepare two types of dreaming-and-the-brain informational items:

- Daily social media posts (for the IASD Facebook page and for IASD members to post on their individual social media pages)
- A handout about dreaming and the brain, to upload to the BAW website and to make available for IASD members to physically hand out or post in their home area.

Members of the Research Committee will be providing much of the content. But, of course, there are other IASD members who have expertise in how dreaming either occurs in or affects the brain. While we mourn the passing of Joanne Rochon, we also wish to celebrate her contributions to the art and dream communities. Joanne passed away on July 27 after two years battling cancer.

Joanne first became involved with IASD in the early 1990's. In 1991, she was invited by Fariba Bogzaran to serve as co-chair of the arts committee. She helped organize the conference art exhibits in Santa Fe in 1994, New York City in 1995, Berkeley in 1996, Asheville in 1997, Hawaii in 1998, and Santa Cruz in 1999. She also served as host for the NYC conference. Regrettably, she had to leave her involvement with the organization in 2000 to care for her mother and sister who were both suffering from Alzheimer's.



In 2013, she was excited about being able to return to her involvement with IASD. She entered the art show in 2013 and received the third place prize. She produced the art labels and award certificates for the annual conferences from each year from 2013 to this last conference in LA. She asked to be on the arts committee and was looking forward to passing on some new ideas for involvement of the organization in the arts.

Her family still faces a large debt for her health care. Less than half of the \$50,000 debt has been collected. IASD has made a contribution in her behalf to the <u>memorial fund</u> and we invite members to also If you want to join our regional team, you are welcome.
