The program is multidisciplinary; therefore, high-quality proposals are invited that fall into any of the following tracks: Research and Theory; Clinical Approaches; Dreamwork Practices; Research; Dreams and Ethnicity; Dreams and the Arts; Education; Religion, Spirituality and Philosophy; Extraordinary, Psi and Lucid Dreams; Dreams and Health; Culture and History; and Mental Imagery. Submission categories include Pre-organized Symposia; Pre-organized Panels; Individual talks to be combined within Symposia; Special Events; Workshops; Morning Dream Groups; and Poster Presentations. IASD encourages presenters of all backgrounds to apply and to be sensitive to matters of diversity and disability in their submissions and presentations. IASD does not discriminate in accepting proposals with respect to race, culture, gender, age, sexual orientation or various forms of disability. Call for Art - Open
Juried Dream Art Exhibition DEADLINE FOR
ENTRIES:
Midnight March 31, 2022, GMT.

Eligibility: We are encouraging artists to submit your original art work about or inspired by dreams to be exhibited and displayed at our conference Juried Dream Art Exhibition. Aside from the exhibit, the event features an Art Reception, a chance to sell your art and perhaps even win a cash award.

Media: All two-dimensional and multi-dimensional media will be considered, including painting, drawing, collage, sculpture, video, and installation art. Artworks that are unusually large or require extensive installation may not be accepted but will be considered. We are not able to accept performance art. Performance artists may wish to consider submitting a proposal for a special event for the conference program (deadline for those proposals is January 10, 2022 as noted above). Although artists are permitted to attend all or part of the conference for the discounted Presenter rates, you do not need to be a conference attendee to participate in the IASD Juried Dream Art Exhibition (there is a \$40 non-refundable jury submission fee, however, for those not attending the conference).



Registration - Open

The rates for this year's conference have been held at the same rate as was advertised for the earlier onsite 2021 conference before we went virtual, and the room rates are actually less (at \$115 per night). Volunteers are able to attend the conference for \$100 by working about half the conference session hours (roughly 14 hours). In Memoriam

Patricia Garfield (1934 - 2021)



Internationally-known dream author and researcher Patricia Garfield, PhD, died at her home in Petaluma, California on Monday, November 22, 2021. Born on August 31, 1934, she was 87 at the time of her death.

Author of the book *Creative Dreaming,* originally published in 1974, Garfield has influenced a generation of dreamers. She was one of IASD's founders, serving as President from 1998-1999. She received our Lifetime Achievement Award in 2012.

After earning her PhD in Clinical Psychology from Temple University in Philadelphia, Garfield taught psychology at several universities on both the East and West Coasts of the United States. Garfield is the best-selling author of twelve books; her first, *Creative Dreaming*, is still so popular that it has been translated into 14 languages. Other publications include *The Healing Power of*

Dreams (1991); The Dream Messenger: How Dreams of the Departed Bring Healing Gifts (1997); Women's Bodies, Women's Dreams (1988); and The Dream Book: A Young Person's Guide to Understand Dreams (2002), which received the 2002 Children's Media Award sponsored by the Parents' Guide to Children's Media. Garfield has been a frequent guest on many major national and international radio and television programs.



More than 150 paid participants attended IASD's second annual *Many Worlds of Lucid Dreaming* online conference. After an opening Zoom presentation from Keynote Speaker Scott Sparrow, 14 additional IASD members shared their vast experience with and/or research into lucid dreaming.

Participants rated the conference extremely highly. One graduate student participant wrote, "The entire conference has been overwhelmingly (in a good way) beneficial for me." Ed Kellogg and Robert Waggoner served as co-hosts for the two-week online conference, and GlideWing provided the technical, registration and 24/7 support for the event.

All presentations included a text and graphics PDF version, and some also included attached videos, Zoom presentations, or PowerPoints to enhance impact. Text versions ensured that participants from all over the world could access the ideas and experiences at any time, even when they could not attend optional "live" presentations, which later became available as viewable recordings.

With IASD's vast expertise in dreaming, IASD-sponsored online conferences represent a powerful means to meet our mission of education and outreach, while growing our membership and prominence in the field.

The Visual Arts Committee team meets once a month to share what has been done and what is left to do, with a summer break; so, about 10 meetings a year on Zoom from around the world.



As you can imagine, none of this happens by itself. We are now a small team: Julie Naumen-Mikulski (co-chair), Robert Gongloff (technical support), Walter Berry (chief organizer and Artist liaison), Delia Puiatti (social media), and myself, Kim Vergil (co-chair). This year, during the COVID-19 pandemic, we were able to put together the stunning arts exhibit that so many saw online. Right now, we need volunteers who can join the committee and help with writing, proofreading, and technical support; IASD meeting liaisons; and onthe-ground exhibition support.

We are pleased to announce that, thanks to a grant from an anonymous donor which is being matched by the IASD Board of Trustees, IASD is able to offer full-time graduate and undergraduate students the opportunity to compete for two (2) \$500 awards for the best student papers in the field of dream investigation in 2021-2022: one for quantitative research; one for qualitative research including history, literature, theory, and the creative arts. The award is named in honor of the late Dr. Ernest Hartmann, a pioneer in dream research and the originator of the program.

New Award Announced! With the intent of promoting the IASD commitment to diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI), starting with the 2021-2022 contest a new annual \$500 award for quantitative or qualitative student dream research related to cultural diversity has been added, open to student applicants who identify as members of ethnic groups that have been underrepresented in dream research. Thirteen Dream Research Grant Proposals, from seven countries around the globe, were received for the 2021 call for grant proposal cycle which closed on October 15, 2021. The peer review ranked the applications according to value to dream science, solid methodology and risk. All were considered quite excellent. With our limited funding, based mostly on research donations, we were able to support five of the proposals this year, including one (a team from Taiwan) which we are delighted to announce received support from our newly announced Diversity, Equity, Inclusion (DEI) funding opportunity. 

The online course committee (OCC) offers online courses on various aspects of dreams and dreaming to those IASD members and nonmembers who would like to take these as part of an independent study program. The initial offerings are the foundation series courses titled *The Science and Psychology of Dreaming* and *The Science of Lucid Dreaming*. While these courses are offered as part of the IASD Dream Study Groups Program, the OCC is responding to requests to also offer them as stand-alone independent study courses, which should appeal to those who prefer to take courses on their own.

The Science and Psychology of Dreaming course is a mini-tutorial which covers:

- · The Basics
- · The Psychology
- · Exceptional Dream Experiences

The course is taught by Robert Hoss, who chairs our research grant committee, and is co-editor of IASD's book *Dreams: Understanding the Biology, Psychology and Culture* from which much of the course is derived. It is designed for anyone interested in a summary of some of the theories and research findings related to our basic understanding of dreaming. Although there is much still being researched about the nature of dreaming, this course offers a snapshot of some of the general practices, recent research and theoretical thinking.

The Science of Lucid Dreaming course covers the history of the first scientific evidence that lucid dreaming is a valid and distinct state of dreaming, and then surveys cutting-edge findings in the field. The course is taught by Robert Waggoner, an internationally known lucid dream pioneer and author of Lucid Dreaming. It is based on his presentation at the 2018 IASD Conference in Scottsdale, Arizona.

Intent

With the intent of promoting our commitment to diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI), as of the 2021-2022

Ernest Hartmann Student Research Awards Call for Submissions, IASD has added a new annual \$500 award for quantitative or qualitative student dream research related to cultural diversity in particular, open to student applicants who identify as members of ethnic groups that have been underrepresented in dream research.

Application Procedure

Submissions for this new annual award, designated **DEI Student Research Award**, will follow the same procedure, requirements, and deadline as the existing awards for quantitative or qualitative research, with the addition of a short statement (a few sentences) confirming the applicant's identity as a member of an ethnic group that has been underrepresented in dream research. Applicants for the DEI Student Research Award will also be considered in the existing quantitative and qualitative award categories, depending on the method of the student's research.
